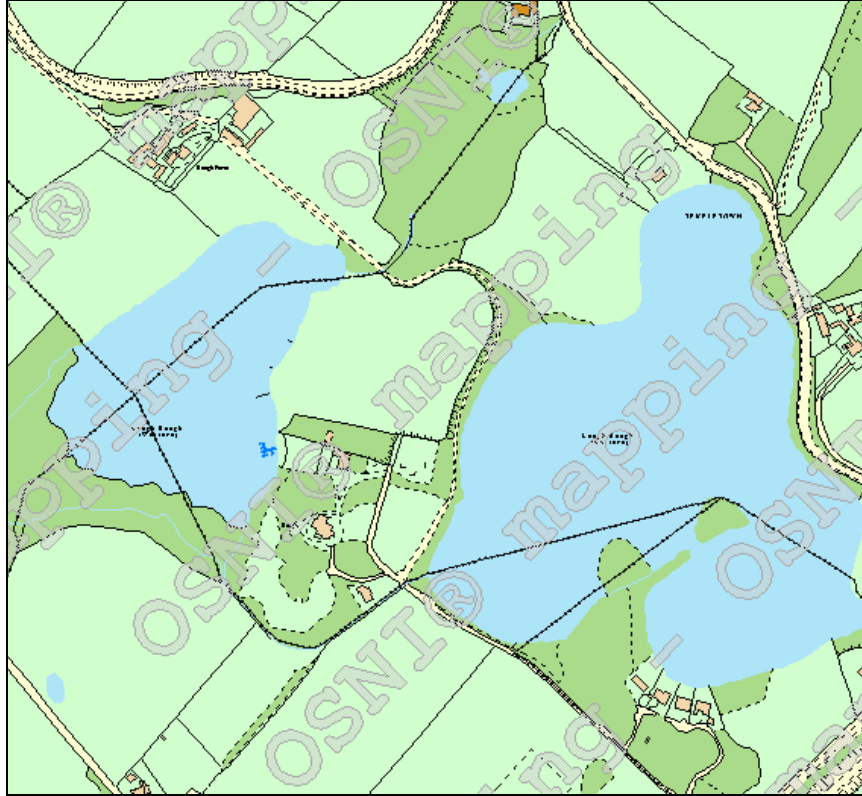

Site Description	<p>Set on top of a drumlin ridge between eastern and western Lough Enagh, this church overlooks the crannog and O'Cahan's castle (LDY014:009 & LDY014:010) in the E lough. The church is almost totally ruinous, with only the E end standing to gable height and a portion of the SE corner of the S transept or side-chapel. It measures approx. 28m x 7m internally, built in local schist dressed on the outside face. A tall narrow lancet window is in the E gable. The masonry of the S transept is superior and obviously later. The interior of the church is very uneven, largely due to the number of burials and both church and graveyard are overgrown. A feature of the graveyard is the large number of graves marked only by stones and slabs of schist.</p> <p>This may be the site of the church recorded in the Annals of Ulster as pillaged by Rortsel Fitton in 1197 and may have been founded by St. Canice. It was the medieval church of Clondermot, with the transept added in later times. A simple stone cross 18m E of the main gate may be a relic of earlier ecclesiastical activity, but there is no sure way of dating it.</p> <p>Enagh Country House located on this ridge. This is also a registered garden.</p>	
Landscape Context (setting)	Set on top of a drumlin ridge between eastern and western Lough Enagh.	
Site Appraisal	An important site, it may have been founded by St. Canice and pillaged in 1197.	
Sensitivity		
Associations	It was the medieval church of the parish of Clondermot and overlooks the O'Cahan stronghold on Enagh Lough. Enagh House and registered garden comprise this location also.

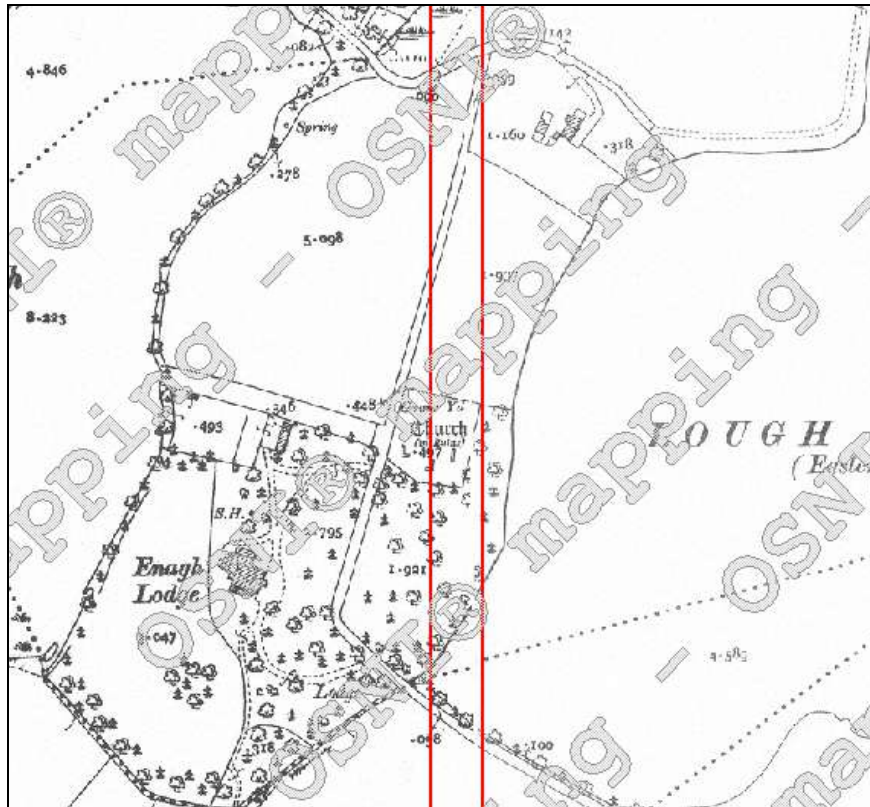
